

What can I do if an off-lead dog approaches my dog or me?



Top Tips

- Position yourself between your dog and the off-lead dog
 - Scatter food down around your feet so that your dog is distracted and not looking at the other dog coming towards you
 - By your dog not showing interest in the other dog, this will help indicate to the other dog that your dog is not interested
 - Pick up your dog if it's appropriate
 - Add distance
 - Stay calm and keep the lead as loose as you can

If the dog keeps approaching

- Firmly say AWAY or NO
 - Ask the owners to recall their dog
 - Throw food towards the other dog to distract them
 - Throw a ball for the other dog to chase after
-

General Advice

- If you see a dog on a lead, please put yours on a lead as well or keep a large gap between you and the other dog.
 - If your dog is going to greet every person they see, please keep them on a lead.
 - Did you know that a dog can be said to be 'dangerously out of control' if someone has a **fear** that they may be injured.
 - Your dog must wear a collar and ID tag when out in public, which must detail their owner's name and address, including postcode.
